Dear LCC Church family,

The conclusion of Lent is in view. Over the next week, more and more of the Liturgy will be stripped away. Chanting will cease on Palm Sunday. The organ volume will get softer and softer as it assumes a more supportive role in worship. Maundy Thursday ends with the stripping of the altar while Psalm 22 is read. Good Friday's sanctuary will feature a bare altar for our Tenebrae service, where candles will be extinguished and lights dimmed.

Then things begin to change. On Easter morning the light begins to slowly break in...the darkness scatters until there is no place left for it. Baptisms are remembered; eucharist is celebrated; resurrection is exclaimed!

Our worship during Holy Week reveals that God is Goodness, Truth, and Beauty. These three exist beyond space and time; they are transcendental. They relate to and seek to describe the nature of our reality and our being.

The three: Goodness, Truth, and Beauty- are not subjective, and for good reason. If Truth was subjective, then we can't get angry when politicians lie to us. If Goodness was subjective, then it's fine for people to abuse others for profit and greed. If Beauty is only in the eye of the beholder, then we have lost the right to be offended by obscene art.

The Good, the True, and the Beautiful are central to our concept of God, and all three work together. Philosopher Peter Kreeft explained why when he said, "Goodness is first in value as truth and beauty have the end of good; beauty motivates us most; and, truth trumps both goodness and beauty."

Over the weeks ahead, we are reminded that we are created to know God, receive His gifts, and worship Him. Because He made us, we want to know the Truth. We desire the Good for His salvation on that Friday. We love the Beautiful exemplified by a suffering Savior whose life surrounds us in stained glass on Sundays. Thus, Goodness, Truth, and Beauty are reflections of a perfect God who sent His Son to be born of Mary, commit no sin, suffer, die and rise again on Easter.

The Good, the True, and the Beautiful are found in Jesus Christ, His Word, His Creation, His redemption, His resurrection, and His doing it all for you.

Come and join us for one of our three Easter Sunday worship services at 7:30, 9:00 and 10:30 am. Along with our brothers and sisters in Christ throughout the world together we rejoice: He is Risen, He is risen indeed, Alleluia!





Woman, Weeping in the Garden (CEDARWOLF)

Text: Daniel Charles Damon; Music: Thomas Pavlechko

- 1. Woman, weeping in the garden, who has pushed the stone aside? Who has taken Jesus' body, Jesus Christ the crucified?
- 2. Woman, waiting in the garden, after men have come and gone, After angels give their witness, silently you watch the dawn.
- Woman, walking in the garden, Jesus takes you by surprise;
 When the gard'ner calls you, "Mary!" faith and joy meet in your eyes.
- 4. Woman, weeping in the garden, weep for joy, for you have seen Jesus, the Messiah, risen; Christ, of whom the prophets dream.
- 5. Woman, dancing from the garden, find the others and proclaim Christ is risen as he promised; tell the world he knew your name!

The text of this hymn was written by Daniel Charles Damon, an ordained Elder in the United Methodist Church and internationally published writer of hymn texts and tunes. His works are included in many current hymnals. He is also the Associate Editor of Hymnody for Hope Publishing Co. in Illinois. He is a jazz pianist and taught church music at the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley, California.

Thomas Pavlechko, composer, was born into a family of organists, pianist, vocalists, and folk dancers. Needless to say, he grew up with music. After just 4 years of piano lessons, he was accepted into the Dana School of Music of Youngstown State University as an organ performance major. His first hymn tune was written at a picnic table after a summer worship meeting in 1982. He now has 73 hymn tunes published in various denominational hymnals. In 2002 he was appointed to serve on the Liturgical Music Editorial Team to assist in choosing liturgical music for the Evangelical Lutheran Worship hymnal that we now use.

I love the text and the tune of this hymn. It describes what transpired at the tomb after Jesus is resurrected. Mary, mother of Jesus, and Mary Magdalene were both at the garden tomb mourning Jesus' death. They were amazed that the stone was rolled away and he was no longer in the tomb. They were faithful to Jesus through everything, even his death, burial, and then to their astonishment and joy, his resurrection.

Have a joyful Easter! He is risen! He is risen indeed!






Women of the Cross Gather Bible Study

A Message on our ELCA Global Missionary Russian Correspondent— Bradn Buerkle

As I am writing this, it is one year ago to the day that our family landed in Istanbul.

A month after that, my two youngest sons and I made our way to Germany, with my wife and oldest son joining us just after the end of the school year.

The time since then has flowed in a way that I have never experienced before - as if extremely slow and intensely quick at the same time. I want to apologize to you that I have found it so hard to reach out and share with you while pondering how to put together a newsletter last fall...then winter.... I aspired to say something profound, clear and honest, something that could reflect our family's personal journey, while at the same recognizing that the bigger and more significant stories have to do with the way God's children are suffering because of the war in Ukraine and the churches' witness in these times. Complicating things further still, in the back of my mind I cannot rid myself of the (admittedly slight) possibility that what I write here could in some way be harmful to the people that I care so much for in Russia and/or that it might negatively affect my chances to get back there some day.

But a year has passed now, and I cannot see how to reach these high expectations of myself. So, in the knowledge that saying something is better than remaining silent, in this newsletter I will try to give you snippets of life in the church in Russia in the context of war. I will inform you of the ministries you are continuing to support, and will hopefully give you more concrete ideas about prayer needs. Finally, I will let you know what other opportunities for ministry God has opened up for me as I continue to serve in mission.

Despite the more-than-challenging times, God has continued to accompany congregations as they engage in preaching the Gospel in word and deed. You will read more about their work below. As for me, distance has hindered my ability to contribute as before, though lay ministers and fellow pastors tell me that they still find my weekly sermons for parishes without a pastor and text studies over Zoom to be useful. I continue to accompany the deanery of the Far East, I lead occasional lectures for local study programs, and I support the specialized ministries (pastoral care and men's ministry)



that have been close to my heart. All of this use of Russian seems to leave little space in my brain for the German I'm trying to learn! Perhaps, with time, I will get a better idea of how God is leading as one episode of life has closed and another begins. In the meantime, I promise to keep you better informed.

Rummage Sale Informational Meeting Tuesday, April 11th at 4 PM Rummage Sale Volunteers Needed April 23 – 29



11 Nations of Native Americans

In the state of Minnesota there are 11 sovereign American Indian nations composed of seven Ojibwe (Chippewa, Anishinaabe) federally recognized reservations, and four Sioux (Dakota) communities. A reservation is land which was retained by American Indians after having ceded large portions of it to the United States government via treaty agreements. Most reservations were created by treaties, but some were created through executive order or by other agreements. After the US-Dakota Conflict of 1862 Congress rescinded all treaties made with the Sioux, and subsequently people were forced from their homes. The communities as they exist now are small fragments of the original reservations.


