### Rooted In Christ

Last month my wife Colleen brought home a small aloe plant. This resulted in me watching You Tube videos on how to best take care of it. As I was watching these clips, a suggestion popped up to view a video on how to re-pot a dying orchid. So down the rabbit hole I went, watching as the gardener took the orchid from its pot and began removing the dirt and clipping off the dead roots. With the good roots present, he proceeded to carefully wash them, followed by repotting it with new soil.

That orchid video has stuck with me and I'm not sure why, but when it came time to think about our 2024 theme for the church it became a little clearer – I chose "Rooted in Christ" for this year's theme. In the Gospel of Luke 13:6-9 it says:

Then he told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, "See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?" He replied, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig round it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down." '

How many of us have neglected to tend the roots of our faith? Together as a church, our staff and council is asking the members of Lutheran Church of the Cross to take time in 2024 to reflect on our relationship with God, one another, and ourselves. We are called to take time to look at our roots and to tend to them so that we are grounded in the nourishing word of God and the saving power of Jesus Christ.

As I look over the 22 years that I have been ordained in ministry, I have helped many members of the churches that I have belonged to tend to the roots of their faith. But like the orchid and the fig tree, I have failed to care of the roots of my own faith.

Last year at our Northeastern Synod Assembly one of the area pastors discussed the importance of a sabbatical. The word sabbatical holds its roots in word Sabbath, meaning to take time to one's self to reflect and ponder our relationship with God and one another. Bishop Amy also stood up and talked about the importance of a sabbatical for our church leaders to find time to rest, reflect and to reconnect with God. Our synod and the national church recommends that a pastor look at taking a sabbatical every 7 years of ministry, recommending that a 12 week sabbatical will benefit both the pastor and the congregation.

In my 22 years of ministry, I have not yet taken a sabbatical. I feel that at this time in life I must tend to my roots so that I can be the best pastor to myself, family, and the future of Lutheran Church of the Cross. With approval from the church council, I am looking to take my sabbatical starting from May 1<sup>st</sup> to the end of July. I have been in conversation with Pastor Michelle and the staff and I am working on logistics and pastoral coverage while I am away.

To the council, staff and the members of Lutheran Church of the Cross, I lift a sincere thank you for the opportunity to tend to my roots so that I can be the best pastor I can be to the members of Lutheran Church of the Cross, our community, and throughout the world. Blessings,



### The season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday.

Lent is a time of simplicity—we pray, receive ashes on our foreheads as a tangible reminder that we are mortal, and we recognize our dependence on God. This year, Lent begins on February 14, Ash Wednesday.

Lent spans 40 days, not including Sundays. Jesus spent
40 days praying in the desert to prepare for his public
ministry, therefore Lent it is a solemn and reflective time
for us as we spend 40 days preparing for the great
mystery of Easter. We use it to prepare our spirits for what is to come, much like spring

ASH Wednesday

To help you prepare for the Imposition of Ashes, here's a devotion to do earlier in the day on Ash Wednesday:

The LORD is kind and merciful. He is patient and full of love.

He does not always criticize. He does not stay anary with us forever.

We sinned against him, but he didn't give us the punishment we deserved.

His love for his followers is as high above us as heaven is above the earth.

And he has taken our sins as far away from us as the east is from the west.

The LORD is as kind to his followers as a father is to his children.

He knows all about us. He knows we are made from dust. Psalm 103:8-14, ERV

Just as we are marked with the cross of Christ in our baptisms, we receive ashes in the shape of the cross on Ash Wednesday. Why ashes...did you know that ashes have many ritual and symbolic meanings? In the Old Testament, there are many instances of the use of ashes as people turned away from sin and toward God. Ashes remind us that God created us from the earth, and by His grace we live and move and have being - and, we are all created from the 'same stuff.' We will also return to the 'same stuff.' May the ashes remind you that in life and beyond life, you belong to God as His beloved child.

You will work hard for your food, until your face is covered with sweat.
You will work hard until the day you die, and then you will become dust again.
I used dust to make you, and when you die, you will become dust again. Genesis 3:19, ERV

**PRAY:** Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth: May these ashes be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

**CONTEMPLATE:** Be mindful and notice what you feel upon receiving the ashes. If there is anything you would like to let go of and place in God's hands, offer it to Him in prayer after receiving the ashes. Consider what it means to you to be claimed as God's own, both in life and afterwards.

**EVENING PRAYER FOR ASH WEDNESDAY:** God of all mercy, you love all that you have made. You forgive the sins of all who are truly sorry. Create and make in us clean hearts, that we, humbly confessing our sins and knowing our brokenness, may receive forgiveness and blessing; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

### **Family Gift Bag Ash Wednesday Devotion**

**PRAYER:** God of mercy, you love everything that you have made. You forgive the sins of all who are truly sorry. Make our hearts clean, that we will tell you what we have done wrong. We know that you will heal us, forgive us, and bless us in Jesus' name. Amen.

**READ:** Matthew 6:-6, 16-21 (from *The Bible for Children*, retold by M. Watts)

Jesus taught his disciples many things about prayer. "Don't go around telling everyone how much you pray, or draw attention to yourself by praying loudly on a street corner. Go into your own room, shut the door quietly and pray in secret to your Father in heaven. God will see you there and reward you." One day, Jesus told a story about two people who prayed. One was full of himself and his own goodness: "There once was a Pharisee who went into the temple and he prayed like this: 'Thank you, God, that I am

not like other people, greedy, dishonest, lying—and I am not like that tax collector over there, who cheats everyone. I fast twice a week and I give a tenth of all my money tothe temple.' Meanwhile, the other person lowered his eyes to the ground because he was so ashamed of himself. He could hardly bring himself to say anything. He was wringing his hands and weeping, 'O God, have mercy on me, a sinner!' "Which prayer did God hear?" asked Jesus, as his disciples looked at each other, knowing there were times when they too were proud and thought they were better than others. "I can tell you, Jesus said, "God heard that poor tax collector's prayer and forgave him, but the Pharisee went away without God's forgiveness."

Every year we tell the story of Jesus' last days with his disciples, his death on the cross, and his resurrection. In this season called Lent, we get ready for the great mystery of Easter by looking at our lives to see how we can more closely follow God. We pray, we study the Bible, we reach out to others who need our help, and we focus on what we need instead of what we want.

Susan Palo Cherwien, as her family refers, was a Poet. Hymnwriter. Thinker. Singer. She grew up in a Finnish community in Ohio as part of a congregation of the Missouri Synod of the Lutheran Church singing hymns and learning to read music through singing hymns. She loved music and the poetry of the church-church music. She went to Berlin, Germany to study where she met her husband, David Cherwien, thus becoming immersed in Lutheran church music. Susan has eight hymns published in our own Evangelical Lutheran Worship hymnal and another eight in the supplement All Creation Sings, from which this hymn comes. She also has books of poetry. She wrote and delivered meditations as part of Hymn Festivals which she and her husband led. We were fortunate to have been a part of one at Bethlehem Lutheran Church a few years back.

Kenneth Naylor, an English composer, wrote the tune for this hymn. The tune name COE FEN is the name of a small fen or marshland on the outskirts of Cambridge. The Fen Causeway was one the major routes into Cambridge where the prestigious school, The Leys School, was located. Kenneth Naylor was the music master and later Director of Music at Leys School.

I love the text for this Lenten hymn because it addresses life and death. From death comes life, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Christ is the life AND the death, Beginning and End.


### A Time For Us Wednesday - Wednesday, Feb 7, 7:00-8:00 PM



### Did You Know?

From the "People for Racial Justice" Group
Submitted by Marty Halvorson

"Donovan Archambault was 11 years old in 1950 when he was sent from the Fort Belknap Indian Reservation in Montana to a government-backed Native American boarding school In Pierre, S.D., where abusive staff forced him to abandon his community's language and customs." (Story from the Minneapolis Tribune) He became bitter and used alcohol to ameliorate his anger for nearly two decades before he pulled his life together. Donovan subsequently achieved a master's degree in education and served as chairman of the Fort Belknap tribes.

For more than 150 years, Indigenous children were taken from their tribes and forced into the boarding schools, which systematically abused students to assimilate them into white society. By 1926 more than 80% of Indigenous school-age children, some 60,000 children, were at boarding schools that were run either by the federal government or religious organizations. We can't change history but we can learn from the injustices that were done and sensitively engage with our Native brothers and sister with respect and dignity.




### **NOVEL IDEAS BOOK CLUB**

In Poland in 1891, Marie Curie (then Marya Sklodowska) was engaged to a budding mathematician, Kazimierz Zorawski. But when his mother insisted she was too poor and not good enough, he broke off the engagement. A heartbroken Marya left Poland for Paris, where she would attend the Sorbonne to study chemistry and physics. Eventually she would go on to change the course of science forever and be the first woman to win a Nobel Prize.

Entwining Marie Curie's real story with Marya Zorawska's fictional one, *Half Life* explores loves lost and destinies unfulfilled—and probes issues of loyalty and identity, gender and class, motherhood and sisterhood, fame and anonymity, scholarship and knowledge. Through parallel contrasting versions of Marya's life, Jillian Cantor's unique historical novel asks what would have happened if a great scientific mind was denied opportunity and access to education.

He will make arrangements for additional clergy support from our members' roster of past clergy as well as lay members to assist Pr. Michelle while he is on leave.

- 3. Constitution and Bylaws/passage/Q & A January 14: Congregational approval of the Bylaws for the 2024 Annual Meeting has been tabled, for further dialogue. Council discussion continued with a motion for a closed session by Pr. Drew Bakken, Second by Colleen Both.

A vote for the passage of the updated Constitution (already assessed and approved by the Synod) will continue to move forward at the January 21st 2024 Annual Meeting.

### Pastors' Reports

### Senior Pastors' Report; Pastor Drew:

Last month my wife Colleen brought home a small aloe plant. This resulted in me watching You Tube videos on how to best take care of it. As I was watching these clips, a suggestion popped up to view a video on how to re-pot a dying orchid. So down the rabbit hole I went, watching as the gardener took the orchid from its pot and began removing the dirt and clipping off the dead roots. With the good roots present, he proceeded to carefully wash them, followed by repotting it with new soil.

That orchid video has stuck with me and I'm not sure why, but when it came time to think about our 2024 theme for the church it became a little clearer – I chose "Rooted in Christ" for this year's theme.

In the Gospel of Luke 13:6-9 it says:

Then he told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, "See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?" He replied, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig round it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down." '

How many of us have neglected to tend the roots of our faith? Together as a church, our staff and council is asking the members of Lutheran Church of the Cross to take time in 2024 to reflect on our relationship with God, one another, and ourselves. We are called to take time to look at our roots and to tend to them so that we are grounded in the nourishing word of God and the saving power of Jesus Christ.

As I look over the 22 years that I have been ordained in ministry, I have helped many members of the churches that I have belonged to tend to the roots of their faith. But like the orchid and the fig tree, I have failed to care of the roots of my own faith.

Last year at our Northeastern Synod Assembly one of the area pastors discussed the importance of a sabbatical. The word sabbatical holds its roots in word Sabbath, meaning to take time to one's self to reflect and ponder our relationship with God and one another. Bishop Amy also stood up and talked about the importance of a sabbatical for our church leaders to find time to rest, reflect and to reconnect with God. Our synod and the national church recommends that a pastor look at taking a sabbatical every 7 years of ministry, recommending that a 12 week sabbatical will benefit both the pastor and the congregation.

In my 22 years of ministry, I have not yet taken a sabbatical. I feel that at this time in life I must tend to my roots so that I can be the best pastor to myself, family, and the future of Lutheran Church of the Cross. With approval from the church council, I am looking to take my sabbatical starting from May 1<sup>st</sup> to the end of July. I have been in conversation with Pastor Michelle and the staff and I am working on logistics and pastoral coverage while I am away.

To the council, staff and the members of Lutheran Church of the Cross, I lift a sincere thank you for the opportunity to tend to my roots so that I can be the best pastor I can be to the members of Lutheran Church of the Cross, our community, and throughout the world.

### Associate Pastor's Report; Pastor Michelle:

- Our Christmas Eve worship services were beautiful and well attended! Thank you to **all** the volunteers, decorators, singers, musicians, tech room workers, nursery, altar guild, those of you who invited family and guests, and all those who were able to attend or watch online. The candlelit singing of Silent Night was beautiful. The 4:00 PM service overflowed into the narthex and the chapel hall. The 2:00 and 6:00 services were well attended, as well. It was a joy to share the Christmas message and celebrate the birth of Jesus with each of you.
- The new year has brought two new opportunities to fellowship together and look into God's Word. StoneHouse Friday will be looking at the book, The Lord's Prayer, by Adam Hamilton, from January 12-February 16 on Fridays from 12:00-1:00 PM at StoneHouse Coffee in Baxter. On Monday mornings, January 22 through March 18 from 9:30-11:30 AM, there will be a women's Bible Study, James Mercy Triumphs, a Beth Moore Bible Study, led by Marilyn Quist and myself. We will meet in the old youth room, or the Chapel Hall if more room is needed.
- This year during the season of Lent we will be doing the 5th Gospel at our Wednesday night services. I am currently talking to people who would be willing to share their faith story. This is a wonderful time for us to hear each other's stories and to grow closer as the body of Christ. Let me know if you would like to share your faith story or know of someone who would. These are holy ground moments. Prayerfully consider saying yes.

- New small groups are forming. A small group is a group of 10-12 people who usually meet once a

  new LCC brothers and sisters-in-Christ.
