Dear LCC family,

Summer is here! How sweet it is to say those words after the long winter that we have all experienced. It is now time to enjoy the warm sunshine and all that the outdoors has to offer. For many of us it means spending time in our yards or gardens, at outdoor events, cruising the lakes, or attending family reunions. For the coming 12 weeks we truly live life to the fullest enjoying all that we can in the Brainerd Lakes Area -before fall and winter come back around, that is!

As the flowers and trees spring forth new life in nature, we too at Lutheran Church of the Cross see new growth - so much so that we are adding a second service to our Sunday morning worship schedule. Beginning June 4th, we will hold an 8 am Summer Sunrise Service. It will be a 30-minute contemplative worship service, much like the Holden Evening Prayer services that we hold during Advent. At 9 am we will hold our traditional worship service with communion, Cross Kids, and staffed nursery. We look forward to having you be a part of one of these worship opportunities throughout the summer.

Together with our Creation Care Team, we will dedicate the four Sundays in June to taking a deeper look at God's creation and thanking God for the beauty that we experience each day. Why do we care for creation? Think of it as *ongoing reformation*. The ELCA document entitled, "Why Lutherans Care for Creation: building on our foundations in the ongoing reformation of the church" (Rhoads, Rev. David, et al.) proposes that Reformation did not end in the 16th century, but is ongoing- and that we are called to rise to the challenges posed by our era. For us, the critical issue is the fate of the Earth – the challenge to protect and restore God's creation from the devastations caused by human activities. Caring for Earth is not just an "environmental cause." It is central to our calling to care for it as our common home and fully integrate creation care into our love of God and neighbor. Perhaps it means looking differently at how we worship, how we organize our church life together, and how we understand ourselves as creatures within creation as a whole.

As we enjoy the beauty of the Brained Lakes Area this summer, let us take the time to take care of and advocate for the beauty of God's creation to make sure that the generations that follow will also share in the same beauty. When God created us he created us in his image and called us to take care of his creation. Though we have not always done a great job of it, let's remember that we are called to be stewards of the earth and make the changes necessary for the sake of the world. "Together we may be able to renew and re-form our church to embrace 'the care and redemption of all that God has made."



Great is Thy Faithfulness (FAITHFULNESS)

Text: Thomas O. Chisholm; Music: William M. Runyan

"It is of the LORD's mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is thy faithfulness." Lamentations 3:22-23

"Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning." James 1:17

Great is Thy Faithfulness

Great is thy faithfulness, O God my Father;
 There is no shadow of turning with thee;
 Thou changest not, thy compassions they fail not;
 As thou hast been, thou forever wilt be.

The author of this hymn, Thomas Obadiah Chisholm, was born in a log cabin in Kentucky in 1866. At age 16, he began teaching school, despite the lack of his own education. He came to Christ at age 27 under the ministry of evangelist H. C. Morrison. But Chisholm's health was unstable, and he alternated between bouts of illness and gainful employment in which he did everything from journalism to insurance to evangelistic work. Through all the ups and downs, he discovered new blessings from God every morning. The third chapter of Lamentations 3 became precious to him: "It is of the LORD's mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is thy faithfulness." (Lamentations 3:22-23).

Thomas later admitted there was no dramatic story behind the writing of "Great is Thy Faithfulness." While serving the Lord in Vineland, New Jersey, Thomas sent several poems to his friend, musician William Runyan, who was so moved by this one that he prayed earnestly for special guidance in composing the music. Runyan was in Baldwin, Kansas, at the time, and the hymn was published in 1923 in Runyan's private song pamphlets.

"It went rather slowly for several years," Thomas recalled. Then Dr. Will Houghton of the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago discovered it, and would say in chapel, "Well, I think we shall have to sing 'Great is Thy Faithfulness.'" It became an unofficial theme song for the Institute; and when Houghton died, it was sung at his funeral.

Still, it remained relatively unknown until popularized around the world by George Beverly Shea and the choirs at the Billy Graham Crusades.

Thomas spent this retirement years in a Methodist Home for the Aged in Ocean Park, New Jersey, where he was frequently seen walking by the ocean and along town streets. Tom Rich, a resident of Ocean Park, recalls his pleasant demeanor as he dropped by the diner, sat on park benches, and fellowshipped with friends at Ocean Park's summer Bible conference.

Thomas died in Ocean Park in 1960. During his lifetime he wrote 1,200 poems and hymns. In addition to "Great is Thy Faithfulness," he is the author of "O To Be Like Thee" and "Living For Jesus".

A Message on our ELCA Global Missionary Russian Correspondent—Bradn Buerkle

Further Developments in Online/In-person Education in Russia

In previous newsletters, I have mentioned that theological education in the Russian Lutheran church currently has a seminary-track program for a "full" theological training (though those of you who have had theological training know that it can never be full enough!) and a practical-ministry focused track called "OK Preacher." ("O" and "K" standing for "Online" "Kourse").



I am involved in both tracks, occasionally as a teacher and occasionally as part of the team that helps steer the path of program development. And while the seminary-track program is relatively well-established, the OK Preacher project is still at an experimental stage, with the first group set to graduate in May of this year. Their training – weekly, two-hour classes over the course of two school years, in addition to two in-person seminars and practical work in congregations – should

prepare them to be highly-qualified lay preachers for our many congregations without a pastor.

In January of this year, logistical reasons (concretely, the cost of travelling long distances) led to the in-person seminar for 15 students being split into two sites – the church center in Omsk (picture) for participants from Siberia and the church in Saratov (European Russia). Unfortunately, I was unable to attend, insofar as we consider it unsafe for me to be in Russia at the moment. Still, it is possible to be involved in the program in other ways, and I am pleased that the church has made the effort to develop a program focused on the spiritual formation of ministers. In light of the unpredictable situation in the country and in the church, we find it very important that our training provides not only the necessary theological knowledge to help them competently preach and provide basic pastoral care, but gives them the tools necessary for further development as those who serve the Gospel.



OPERATION SANDWICH began several years ago, making and delivering peanut and butter sandwich lunches to

locations in Brainerd and Baxter. Just before COVID, Operation Sandwich added a Northern Route and instead of making sandwiches, teams of volunteers assembled grocery bags of lunch food to carry a family through the week – jars of peanut butter & jelly, bread, granola bars, Goldfish, fruit snacks, fresh fruit—to stops in Nisswa, Pequot Lakes, Jenkins, and Pine River. Last year we averaged 1210 lunches per week and an average of 47 families served.

Once again, LCC will be the hub of Operation Sandwich for the Northern Route, beginning June 8 – August 25. It is being coordinated by Bridges of Hope and will be led by staff member, Ann (Hunnicutt) Pickar. Past volunteers will be receiving an email from Ann, and anyone interested in getting involved in this neighborhood ministry may contact Ann (ann@bridgesofhopemn.org or 218-825-7682).

I have enjoyed being the "face" of Operation Sandwich for the past years and will be involved, but I also need to step back and act a bit more "retired." Feel free to ask me questions! A Tribute Exhibition Celebrating the Life and Art of Vickie Reph (1947 – 2020)

Vickie Reph was an accomplished artist and beloved member of Lutheran Church of the Cross. Her art career goes back many years creating and painting ceramics—figures, pottery and dishes—many of which are still in use today.

More recently Vickie turned to watercolor painting and soon her paintings were reproduced as limited edition prints and notecards and had a wide distribution in the area.

Did You Know?

From the "People for Racial Justice" Group Submitted by Marty Halvorson

Have you ever wondered what it was like to live as an Indigenous person? It is difficult to know the answer to this question since there is no written history and we are talking about what archaeologists say is prehistoric times. The Mille Lacs region of Minnesota has been home of both the Dakota and Ojibwe tribes since as early as 3000 BCE. Before 1000 BCE Indians were making copper tools. The first known European contact occurred in 1679 when Daniel Greysolon explored the region. Greysolon traded with the Dakota at their thriving community located at Mille Lacs Lake and claimed the land for France. That is one of the first examples of how explorers claimed land for a foreign entity which they had no right to do. The committee on People for Racial Justice recently had the privilege to tour the Mille Lacs Indian Museum and Trading post. The way in which the Indigenous people lived was a part of that tour. Their economy of lifestyle was fascinating to see. If you have further interest, we recommend a tour.





CREATION CARE

Our Solar Journey

LCC's journey to a solar installation began in 2009 when the Creation Care Team began dreaming about what renewable energy could look like at our church. Over the next year we did a lot of research on various renewable energy options, and with approval from Church Council decided to start looking into a solar installation at LCC. We decided to work with the Rural Renewal Energy Alliance out of Pine River (now called REAL Solar) because of their local connection and expertise in designing these types of systems. RREAL completed a site assessment in 2011 and the Creation Care Team began hosting adult forums and presenting updates to Council on the project. In 2015 Church Council granted approval for the project and for a fundraising campaign to install a solar array at LCC. Later that year it became necessary to replace a large portion of the church's roof. In order to avoid over-burdening the congregation with fundraising requests, the Stewardship Committee recommended combining the solar and roof projects into one mortgage proposal to the congregation. This proposal was approved by a vote of the congregation on August 30th, 2015.

The solar installation was estimated to cost \$40,000. The final project cost came in just under that at \$38,718. The majority of the project (just over 80%) was funded through individual donations from both congregation members and non-members in our community, a grant from the Clean Energy Resource Teams, a rebate from Minnesota Power, and in-kind labor for trenching. The Congregation's investment through the mortgage approved in 2015 made up the remaining 19% (\$7,467).

From their installation in May of 2016 through December of 2022, our solar panels have produced 65 megawatt hours of electricity or 9% of LCC's electricity needs. This has resulted in an estimated total savings of around \$8,500 for the congregation over the past 6 years, which has more than fully paid back the portion of the mortgage used to fund the project.

Another important effect of our solar installation is that it has made us more conscious of our energy use and has spurred efforts to upgrade light fixtures and appliances throughout the church. Due to these energy efficiency improvements over the past few years, LCC has reduced our electricity use by over 40% since 2017! This is a major accomplishment and amplifies the impact of our solar arrays.

We are proud to be one of the first congregations in Minnesota to include solar in our efforts to be good stewards of God's creation and are happy to report that many other churches are following in our footsteps. Thank you for your support of this important ministry for our congregation! Some of our goals for the future are to provide more real-time reporting of our solar energy production to the congregation, continue to reduce our electricity use by upgrading lighting and appliances, and explore adding an additional array to increase our solar impact.

Our Solar Impact

65 megawatt hours of electricity is equivalent to:

- 45 metric tons of carbon offset
- 2,000 trees (a mature tree removes 48 lbs of CO2 per day)
- Enough electricity to power the average MN household for 7 years
- Power an Energy Star refrigerator for 108 years
- Light up the Eiffel Tower for 3 days
