Dear LCC Friends and Family,

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent, a season of prayer and self reflection. But what is the significance of the ashes? First, the prior year's palm branches were kept, dried, and burned to form the ashes for the next year's Ash Wednesday service, signifying the full cycle of the Lenten journey.

Ashes were used for cleaning. Way long ago, before there were scouring pads and Soft Scrub, people would use ashes to rub against metal or wood to remove the rust or dirt and to make the rough smooth. During Lent, we ask God to expose any inner dirtiness that needs to be revealed. We confess it, come clean, and our rough edges are made smooth, so that Christ may be proclaimed and glorified in our lives.

Ashes remind us that we were made from dust and to dust we shall return. When God created Adam, God bent down, gathered a handful of dust and dirt, and breathed His breath, His Spirit into the dust and formed man. Ashes remind us of our fragileness and that we are not meant to live for all eternity here on earth. This is just our temporary home until we are taken to our forever home in paradise for all eternity!


In the month of January our income was more than our expenses by \$21,454.


Daylight savings time begins Sunday, March 10th. Be sure to spring your clocks forward one hour Saturday night.


Also take time to check and/or replace your batteries in your smoke alarms and CO2 detectors.

#### LENT IS A GOOD TIME TO TEND TO THE GARDEN OF YOUR SOUL

We might think of Lent as a time to get ready for Easter. Lent is about the *transformation* that always comes before new life. It is a time for cleaning, scouring, weeding, shedding, and breaking open to the possibility of something new and wonderful.

The whole story of Jesus is about transformation: not just his time in the desert, or his dying and rising, but also the stories he told that



opened minds and hearts, and the loving actions that changed so many lives. The story of Jesus invites us to think of Lent as a time to explore the spaciousness, openness, freedom, and expansiveness of divine love. And remember that Jesus told us to love with our heart and soul.

Our heart and soul are just like a garden. We have to be careful what we let grow there. They need to be nurtured and cared for, and we need a master Gardner to guide our way. Tending to our heart and soul means listening to God's voice and being attentive to the movement of the holy spirit in our lives.

Winter seems to lull the world to sleep; the woods seem quieter, the gardens are still and the sky grays over. It is a season of rest and stillness. Just as the ground in the garden needs the rest, so does our soul. In gardens, as in life, there are seasons of work, harvest and stillness. To tend means to care for, look after, give attention to, nurture and maintain. Doesn't our soul need that as much as a garden does?

When it comes to tending a garden, we use tools designed for the job. For our soul, the most effective way to tend it is to go to the very Gardener of our souls, the One who created us. He offers us His Word and His Spirit in order to tend our souls towards fruitfulness.

Like any garden that goes untended, the garden of our soul may start to grow weeds which cause the thriving plants start to wither and die. Sometimes bad habits, like gophers or weeds, begin to live there and kill off the good habits. Things like worry and fear, doubt, betrayal, and anger can take root— weeds that if not pulled, will be allowed to deeply root. Each weed needs to be pulled out to make room for something beautiful to take its place; something of God. Something that brings joy—something worthwhile. Worry can be pulled out and be replaced with peace; fear can be replaced with courage; doubt with trust, and anger with self-control. Peace, courage, self control.....things with a good intention and things that bring us more peace.

We draw closer to God when we recognize and acknowledge that in all things he is glorified. God's grace and salvation can be appreciated at any time but perhaps mostly in the spring, when new life reminds us of the promise that we can always begin again.

The darkest days of winter are behind us as we move toward the increasing light of spring — *lecten* in Old English, the lengthening of days. More light permits new growth. What a wonderful analogy for growing anew during Lent, and the unfurling of faith in the light of Easter.

In all of this, we hope this Lenten season helps us to turn to God the way plantings turn to light. Just as there are tasks that must be done in order to maintain a healthy and productive garden so, too, do we live out the metaphor as we attend to garden of our soul. We can tend to and nurture those things that give us peace, and get rid of the things that don't. We can *listen to God's voice and be attentive to the movement of the holy spirit in our lives* and nourish good things like peace, courage, self control and love.

Human development studies suggest that people are more likely to make friends until we're in our early 20s. As young people, we trust peers easily, spend more time in places that incubates friendships, and we have more time. Luckily, church is one place that all ages can make friends. Community is one of the reasons a person, or couple, or families join a congregation. Church friends are important to children and youth. By my definition, church friends are friends that people only see at church. That's what makes church friends special!

#### Plus, here are 7 reasons on why church friends matter:

- It's Biblical! There are several biblical friendships worth mentioning like Kind David and Jonathan, Elijah and Elisha, and Ruth and Naomi. Even Jesus had close friends known as the disciples. Were any of these relationships perfect? Not at all, but what we learn is that we are made for each other!
- **Safe Space:** As parents and caregivers know, school friends and neighbors can ditch their kids. They can fight, turn their backs on each other, or split up. That's why church friends are different; they are always there. Church should be a reliable and safe space for all to feel accepted and loved.
- **Start Young Volunteering:** Kids and students love to help! People will learn their names if they are ushering or greeting or serving communion. Parents and caregivers can help their kids and students make church friends by showing up regularly, serving together, and participating in what program is available.
- **Support and Comfort:** I was listening to NPR the other day, and the conversation was about the how anxiety and depression has increased in young people. Church friends don't have the same expectations as school friends or neighbors. In fact, in every youth group I have been a part of, the students have been there for each other. They can be a source of comfort and support to this
- **Stay on the Path!** I read somewhere that kids and students who are associated with a faith community are at less risk for risky behaviors. Church friends can help kids and student stay on the path of faith, serve God's community, and love one another.
- **Church Friends Can Be Intergenerational:** I never said that church friends had to be the same age. Though the most common type of church friends are of similar age, people of all intergenerations can be friends. There are not too many places left where a 3 year old can be friend an 83 year old. Being intergenerational is a gift to the church!

#### And Can It Be That I Should Gain? (SAGINA)

Text: Charles Wesley (1707-1788); English leader of the Methodist movement; wrote other texts to such as "Christ the Lord is Risen Today", "Love Divine, all Love's Excelling" and "Hark the Herald Angels Sing"

#### Music:

#### Thomas Campbell (1777-1844) Scottish poet and composer

But He was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities; The chastisement for our peace was upon Him, and by His stripes we are healed. Isaiah 53:5

Charles Wesley was born just before Christmas in 1707. He was premature and neither cried nor opened his eyes. His mother, Susanna, kept him tightly wrapped in wool until his actual due date, whereupon he opened his eyes and cried.

At age eight, he was taken to London to attend Westminster School. At thirteen, he became a King's Scholar at Westminster, and upon graduating, Charles enrolled at Oxford. He was nineteen and full of life. He later said, "My first year at college I lost in diversions."

During his second year at Oxford, he grew serious about spiritual things. Neither he nor his brother, John, had yet confessed to be a Christian, but they began seeking to live the Christian life so *methodically* they were dubbed "Methodist" by fellow students.

Their studies completed, the brothers volunteered to go to Georgia, a new colony in America for those in Britain's debtors' prisons, founded by Colonel James Oglethorpe. But as a missionary, Charles was an utter failure. He was demanding and autocratic, and he insisted on baptizing infants, not by sprinkling, but by immersing them three times in succession. One angry woman fired a gun at him.

Charles left America ill and depressed. Sometime later, John also returned in low spirits. Finding themselves in spiritual crisis, the brothers began attending meetings let by the Moravian Christian, Peter Boehler. Finally, on Sunday, May 21, 1738 Charles, 31, wrote, "I now found myself at peace with God, and rejoiced in hope of loving Christ. I saw that by faith I stood."

John came to Christ about the same time, saying, "I felt my heart strangely warmed."

Wesley wrote this hymn to celebrate his coming to Christ. It is one of the most popular Methodist hymns to this day.

- And can it be that I should gain an interest in the Savior's blood?
   Died He for me, who caused His pain? For me, who Him to death pursued?
   Amazing love! How can it be that Thou, my God, shouldst die for me?
- 2. He left His Father's throne above, so free, so infinite His grace! Emptied Himself of all but love, and bled for Adam's helpless race! 'Tis mercy all, immense and free, for, O my God, it found out me.

- 3. Long my imprisoned spirit lay fast bound in sin and nature's night.

  Thine eye diffused a quickening ray; I woke the dungeon flamed with light!

  My chains fell off, my heart was free, I rose, went forth, and followed Thee.
- 4. No condemnation now I dread; Jesus, and all in Him, is mine!
  Alive in Him, my living Head, and clothed in righteousness divine,
  Bold I approach th' eternal throne, and claim the crown, through Christ my own.

A beautiful and meaningful hymn for us to sing during our Lenten journey the month of March.

#### Maundy Thursday and Good Friday (Tenebrae) Services for Parents, Children and Youth

Maundy Thursday was the day that Jesus shared his final meal with his disciples before he was crucified—also known as the Last Supper and the Washing of the Feet, this day signals the ending of the Lenten Season, and is a significant part of the events leading



up to Good Friday. Maundy means 'mandate or command.' In this case, it refers to John 13:34 where Jesus issues a command with these words: Love each other. You must love each other just as I loved you. Jesus said this after washing the disciples feet. In those days, a good host would offer feet washing to their guests (since they wore sandals, their feet were always dusty and dirty), and the lowest servants would do the washing. Jesus performs the washing as a symbol of humility and hospitality, as well as of washing away our sin, and His words encourage us to forgive and love each other. Maundy Thursday was the final meal of wine and bread that Jesus and the disciples shared, and this later became the Sacrament of Communion to remind us of how Jesus gave his body (bread) and blood (wine) as a sacrifice for the salvation of us all—a gift from God. Each year at LCC, our children and youth who have prepared to receive their First Communion will do so at our Maundy Thursday worship service. They will help serve Communion and assist in the Stripping of the Altar at the conclusion of the service, as well. This is a custom that represents how Jesus was stripped of His garments and humiliated when he was abandoned by His disciples and fell into the hands of the Jews on Good Friday. At the conclusion of the Last Supper, less than 24 hours remained in Jesus' life.

Good Friday is one of the most significant days of the church year. It is marked with a Tenebrae worship service that reflects on Jesus' Passion Story. Tenebrae means 'darkness,' and the service includes a lot of symbolism, including the last words of Jesus, which reveal to us how He was both divine and human. Over the course of the service, the lights and candles in the sanctuary



are gradually extinguished as a symbol of the darkness of sin and the death of Jesus, the 'Light of the World.' The only light that is not extinguished is the Christ Candle. It is carried out of the sanctuary at the conclusion of the service and accompanied by a loud noise to symbolize the agony of creation at Jesus; death. The Christ Candle will be returned to the sanctuary on Easter Sunday morning.

Both of these services at LCC will involve our children and youth. It may be helpful to prepare children attending these services for what they will experience and what they may feel. Participating in these services is a good investment of time devoted to our faith journey. It is okay for it to be unsettling and uncomfortable; it is okay for it to be personal, reflective, and perhaps emotional. After all, there would be no Easter or Christmas without Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

#### Did You Know?

From the "People for Racial Justice" Group Submitted by Marty Halvorson

Not all issues of racial justice reside with people of color. In the book "Poverty, by America," Matthew Desmond addresses the issues of poverty among not only the traditional racial groupings but also among the white population. In his analysis of how America has tried and failed to alleviate poverty he describes some interesting concerns. The poor are defined as those who can't afford necessities, like food and housing. He insightfully suggests that poverty changes how one thinks. The example of a person who does not have a place to live or enough to eat virtually eliminates that person from pursuing education. This is not only true for people of color but the white population, too.

Our government has consistently increased the spending for people who fall below the poverty line. The question is, why has that not decreased the number who live in poverty? Some of the reasons that he suggests includes the following: 1) A fair amount of government aid never reaches those in need. In 2020 only 22 cents on the dollar reached the impoverished. 2) States are not required to spend the money allotment given each year. Arizona spent welfare dollars to pay for abstinence-only sex education. Oklahoma spent more than \$70 million on the Oklahoma Marriage Initiative providing counseling services to everyone in the state and not only the poor.

Did you know that the average white family with a high school education has more wealth than the average black family with a college education? There is so much more that we need to know and that needs to be done in helping people move out of poverty.



#### **Nisswa Recycling Center Update**

#### So, What Happened?

If you haven't heard by now, the Nisswa recycling center situated behind the Nisswa Fire Hall will be closed or relocated by May 1<sup>st</sup> of this year. The Nisswa City Council came to this decision after numerous hours of weighing the pros and cons, public comments, and safety considerations. In an effort to minimize impact on

local citizens, the council also chose to implement an ordinance requiring all licensed haulers that wish to service the City of Nisswa to provide curbside recycling free of charge. To clarify, this free recycling service is only available to those already utilizing a hauler's trash services. This is not the first time an ordinance such as this has been enacted. The City of Nisswa now joins other communities like Pine River, Pequot Lakes, Crosslake, Baxter, and Brainerd who already require haulers to provide free curbside recycling services to residents.

#### What Should I Do Now?

If you already have trash services, contact your current hauler to set up recycling services. Some haulers may start your recycling service right away,

while others may choose to wait until the May 1<sup>st</sup> effective date. Also be aware not all haulers offer the same recycling service. Most offer an every-other week collection schedule that may, or may not, fall on the same collection day as your trash. However, Waste Partners offers recycling services every week on the same day as your trash collection!

#### **How Do I Recycle Right?**

Do you look for the "chasing arrows" symbol on packaging to determine if it is recyclable? Unfortunately, that symbol is not an indication of a recyclable product, but rather the type of resin it is manufactured from. Additionally, some products may say they are recyclable, but the truth is that our area or region is not capable of recycling the product (as shown by the toothpaste tube pictured below).



What many folks fail to understand is that recycling wrong can have a dramatically negative effect by creating "load contamination". This occurs when a recycling load contains too many non-recyclable items, often requiring the sorting facilities to dispose of the collected materials. Some major contaminants that are not recyclable include plastic bags, styrofoam, food products, yard

waste, household hazardous waste (batteries, bulbs, paints, cleaners, etc.), dishes & glassware, ceramics, and "tanglers" (hoses, hangers, cords, wire, etc.). Do your best to avoid "wish-cycling" and help reduce load contamination.

#### LCC Property Report: Dale Peterson

• I've been working with 3 additional church insurance carriers to obtain competitive quotes on insurance for LCC business property, workers compensation and commercial umbrella coverage. The first carrier would not quote on this limited coverage, the second company quoted a price well above our current cost, and the third carrier is currently in underwriting. On a related note, we have several non-critical items to address to bring our property into compliance for safety for loss control. I'm working with Todd on these items.

- I contacted the cement contractor that will be installing our handicap ramp at the north entrance. He is currently out of town, but he did call me and assured me that LCC will be one of their first projects. I am pushing for completion early this spring when the weather permits and materials are available.
- We have received some initial general quotes for new carpet in the Narthex and hallways. Commercial
  grade carpet tiles are under consideration.
- We have numerous additional property projects for 2024. The list includes assisting with the playground installation, creating a family/handicap accessible bathroom, painting the conservatory, addressing plumbing needs, and relocating the garbage container. We also have to include the spring cleanup, landscaping improvements, cleaning the chairs in the Celebration Center, and relocation of the rummage sale pods and garden sheds. I would also like to take care of the burn pile on the east lot. I will call a meeting of the property committee to create a working schedule for this year.

LCC week at the Shelter is March 3 through the 10th. There are 14 scheduled volunteer shifts and two are filled. If we continue to do this volunteer work as a congregation, it's my hope that we will be able to have more than half of the shifts filled.   together.
- Cross Kids lessons/materials are completed through April. Sally Hodgson put together the Jan. and Feb. Take Home Faith bags and Karin Wolter will do the March bags.
- Attendance at Cross Kids continues to be good, as does nursery attendance.
- Our Playground Proposal was approved at the Annual Congregational Meeting and Pr. Drew, Todd and Kari will meet with Jon and the Burke Rep next week, followed by a meeting with the Task Force. Kari has developed a Fund-Raising Letter that will be sent out to the congregation in late February. So far, we have \$26,000 donated and we need a total of approximately \$60,000. We hope to get this project started in May.
- Scholarship materials and Senior Recognition Sunday info was sent out to all graduating seniors, and
  grade reports have been submitted from our Scholarship recipients from 2023, so their funds are in

- Our High School Youth Group will continue meeting during Lent and they will use the Lenten Mentor materials as study guides.

- Route 56 will go on hiatus during the season of Lent.
- CYFM will host our Palm Sundae Fellowship after 9am worship, serving yogurt parfaits and scones.
- Kari will be meeting with a small group of our parents of younger children in an effort to begin plans for an extended Cross Kids Sunday experience that will include music, video and whatever else we can come up with. We anticipate that this will occur during Coffee Fellowship time. The parents who are interested are willing to help get this initiative off the ground and keep it going. I am looking forward to seeing what we can add to our Children's ministry on Sunday mornings!
